Doctor of Ministry (D.Min.)

Pursue your calling at Perkins

The D.Min. Program provides the opportunity for advanced study in the areas of vocational and leadership formation and community building. Integrating theological reflection and ministerial practice with these areas of study, Christian leaders build their theological knowledge and gain skills to effectively engage in ministerial work in contexts of change and transition.

D.Min. students are to complete 30 credit hours with a GPA of 3.0 or higher within 3 years. The courses that are taken in the D.Min. Program are:

- The Person and Role of a Leader in Ministry
- Leadership and Vocation in Church and Community: A Theological/Historical Exploration
- Models of Leadership, Social Institutions and Community Engagements

- Integrative Seminar and Strategic Planning in Contexts of Change and Transitions
- Directed Study (with assigned advisor)
- Writing Project Seminar

Ministry Paths: The Doctor of

Ministry (D.Min.) degree provides the opportunity for advanced study that integrates theological reflection and ministerial practice with a contextual focus for people in professional ministry within the church

The goals of the degree are to:

Seek vocational depth and direction

Gain theological knowledge and understanding of vocational and leadership identity in tandem with developing skills for relevant practices of ministry that build communities in context

Acquire knowledge, critical insights and skills to exercise leadership grounded in Christian vocation in contexts of transition and change within the Church and the community **Course Requirements:** Three years, 30 credit hours total. Two years of coursework, consisting of two 3 credit hour courses each June and January (12 credit hours per academic year) for a total of 24 credit hours. The third year consists of one 3 credit hour directed study, and one 3 credit hour course for the completion of the writing project. Total of 30 credit hours over three years with a GPA of 3.0 or above.
